**Deadwood's First Memorial Day, 1884**

The first observed Memorial Day in Deadwood occurred on May 29, 1884. Early Memorial Day observations were community-wide events that included an assortment of activities, public addresses, and music. Local newspapers ran lengthy articles covering the day's

**1950s Era Deadwood Police Jacket Donated**

Last month, Paul Thomson of the Lawrence County Emergency Management donated this 1950s era Deadwood Police Department jacket to the City of Deadwood, once owned by Frank Maynard.

Frank Maynard grew up and graduated from Deadwood High School in 1963 and served on the Deadwood Police Department from 1965 to 1969.

Upon receiving the jacket, city staff enlisted the help of Clark Sowers and Black Hills Laundry & Dry Cleaning of Belle Fourche. Clark graciously donated the service and his staff did an excellent job cleaning and pressing the jacket in preparation for display.

## News From The Neighborhood

Welcome to the Library Neighborhood, home of Deadwood's Historic Carnegie Library. In April 1903, The Round Table Women's Club and the Deadwood Women's Club facilitated discussion between the Deadwood City Commission and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie to negotiate funding for a library.

On April 17, 1903, the City Commission accepted Carnegie's proposal of \$15,000.00 for the construction of the library. Within six months, plans from local architect Charles A. Randall for a one-story, Greek style structure were approved by the Commission. Local contractors Mullen & Munn were awarded the contract and work officially began in March 1904. The library was officially dedicated in front of a large crowd on November 8, 1905. Today, the Carnegie Library continues to serve the citizens of Deadwood and Lawrence County.

Come stroll through the Library Neighborhood where you can also visit Methodist Park. This city park mimics the layout of the original church that once stood here, with benches laid out like pews and a giant brick and steel steeple designed to match the original church bell tower. Also make sure to visit St. John's Episcopal Church which was built in 1880.

## 2023 Table of Detected Regulated Contaminants For Deadwood (EPA ID 0104)

Terms and abbreviations used in this table:

\*Maximum Contaminant Level Goal(MCLG): the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

\*Maximum Contaminant Level(MCL): the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

\*Action Level(AL): the concentration of a contaminant which, when exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow. For Lead and Copper, 90% of the samples must be below the AL.

\*Treatment Technique(TT): A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water. For turbidity, 95% of samples must be less than 0.3 NTU

\*Running Annual Average(RAA): Compliance is calculated using the running annual average of samples from designated monitoring locations.

Units:

\*MFL: million fibers per liter

\*pCi/l: picocuries per liter(a measure of radioactivity)

\*ppt: parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

\*mrem/year: millirems per year(a measure of radiation absorbed by the body)

\*ppm: parts per million, or milligrams per liter(mg/l)

\*ppq: parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter

\*NTU: Nephelometric Turbidity Units

\*ppb: parts per billion, or micrograms per liter(ug/l)

\*pspm: positive samples per month

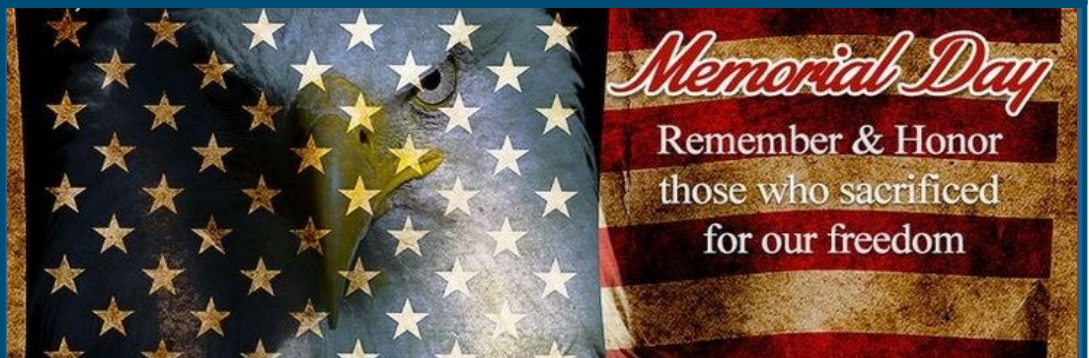
